Decision Assessment
There was one appeal during the reporting period from a decision of the board applying Marketing Costs and Losses to a producer who sold milk outside of the regulated system. The decision from the appeal overturned the amount determined by the board. The appeal was subsequently the matter of a Judicial Review (JR) at the Supreme Court of BC. The learning from the appeal and JR is to ensure that all regulatory participants fully understand the authority of the Milk Board.
