One appeal was received by BCFIRB in November of 2023. The BCMMB sought an order summarily dismissing the appeal on two grounds: the appeal is not within the jurisdiction of BCFIRB, and the appeal was filed outside of the applicable time limit. In May of 2024, the BCFIRB granted the BCMMB's application for summary dismissal and the appeal was dismissed with no order as to costs.

Graduated Entry Program (GEP) 2014 to 2017. New Entrant Program (NEP) launched in August 10, 2018	The NEP program was launched in Aug 10, 2018. The candidates selected display genuine intentions to be actively engaged in milk production and succeed in increasing sustainability in the dairy industry. The selection committee evaluates and assesses candidates as ones that are equipped with the appropriate experience and skills needed to succeed in dairy operations and farming and are now able to pursue these operations because of the quota provided in the program. The assistance provided by the NEP program enables competent individuals, who otherwise may have been hindered by barriers to entry into the industry, with the resources needed to succeed and ensure longevity of the dairy industry. The NEPO (New Entrant Program Organic), an organic stream, became effective for the 2023 New Entrant Program.
